

Canyon Celebrates 40 Years, Completion of Modernization

Canyon High School celebrated its 40th year anniversary and the rededication of its newly modernized campus with a ceremony in the campus amphitheatre on May 20. Guests gathered in the school library for breakfast, then joined the school's senior class for the actual ceremonies.

It is appropriate that the senior class be invited to the ceremony, since these students have had to live with the throes of construction from the day they walked onto the campus, according to Assistant Principal Pete Getz, who coordinated the event. Other guests included students and staff from the school's earliest years as well as recent graduates and community leaders.

Canyon High School first opened its doors in fall of 1968 to serve students on the east side of the Santa Clarita Valley. As the Hart District's second high school, Canyon relieved overcrowding at Hart High School and eliminated a cross-valley commute for eastside students.

Contractors are still putting the finishing touches on some elements of Canyon's \$50 million modernization program, which includes a new administration center, two-story science classroom building, Associated Student Body office and food service facility. (more)

Hart District Schools Rate Among Highest in State

Eight Hart District schools rank among the top 20 percent of schools in the State of California based on a statewide ranking released this spring by the California Department of Education. The ranking is based on standardized test results from spring 2007 which were released last August.

Six Hart district schools already have achieved the state goal, with API scores above the 800 level. (more)



Sierra Vista Named Fitness Demo Center

Sierra Vista Junior High School has been recognized by the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports and the President's Challenge as a Physical Activity and Fitness Demonstration Center. The school received a letter from Washington, D.C., confirming the appointment and a Demonstration Center Banner to be posted in the school's Fitness Center.

The school's physical education program is moving away from the traditional sports skills model to a curriculum that focuses on overall health and fitness. (more)

Estrada Named Alliance Director

Adriana Estrada, the former assistant director of career services for the Graduate School of Education and Psychology at Pepperdine University, has been named executive director of the SCV School & Business Alliance.

The Alliance serves as a liaison between local schools and the business community and sponsors a number of programs to help local students prepare for the world of work after graduation.

The Alliance is introducing a new Web portal that will make school-to-career information available to students, parents, teachers and counselors across the district.

The district-wide effort includes programs that are classroom based, community based and Web based, and every high school in the district is expected to have programs in place utilizing each of the three elements by next fall. (more)



Hart District Stretches Local Bond Dollars

In 2001, Santa Clarita Valley voters passed Measure V, a local bond issue which provided \$158 million for construction of new schools and modernization of existing facilities in the Hart School District. The district has also tapped into a number of state funding sources and made optimal use of developer mitigation fees. The result is more than \$370 million in school construction through today, including four new schools, three major modernization projects and some work at almost every district school.

The Hart District has done much since the passage of Measure V in 2001 to create better learning opportunities for district students. The district is excited about several future projects, including both modernization and new construction, and continues to search out ways to multiply the financial resources available. (more)

Hart District to Launch Three Major Modernization Projects

The Hart District will launch major modernization programs at Hart High School, Placerita and Sierra Vista junior high schools this summer and fall, the first part of a multiphase program to bring the facilities up to par with the district's new and recently modernized campuses.

Once the projects go to bid, actual costs can be projected, which will determine whether all of the proposed work can be accomplished in the first phase.

When funds become available, later phases will replace portable classrooms with new permanent facilities to relieve overcrowding on those campuses.

The first to begin construction will be Placerita Junior High School, whose plans have already been approved by the Department of State Architects. Work is expected to begin this summer and take one year.

Sierra Vista Junior High School's actual construction is slated to begin this fall and is expected to be completed during a "summer sprint" period of intensive construction during the summer of 2009.

The most extensive modernization program, at Hart High School, is scheduled to begin in late October/early November of 2008 and will require two years. (more)
