The orchestra and bands from Rancho Pico Junior High School are bringing acclaim for the school's musical programs from band and orchestra festivals across Southern California this spring. The Mustangs' orchestra earned a Unanimous Superior rating from the regional festival sponsored by the Southern California School Band and Orchestra Association—a festival to



which groups are invited only after they earn superior ratings at qualifying festivals. Rancho Pico's orchestra also earned Unanimous Superior at Littlerock High School, the highest rating a group can achieve. The school's Advanced Band earned Unanimous Superior at a qualifying festival at Montebello High School, and a Superior rating at the regional SCSBOA festival. The combined Beginning/Intermediate bands also participated at the Montebello festival and earned a Superior rating. Rancho Pico's instrumental music director is Randy Gilpin.


Skateboard Factory Tour Rated 'Awesome'




and how he turned his life around. Element provided lunch (the chairs at the table were constructed of skateboards!).

Hart High School's baseball team has been recognized by the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation as having the highest grade point average in a school with 1500 or more students. Hart District Regional Occupational Program (ROP) is developing ROP Virtual Enterprise (VE) a hands-on class in which students create and run a virtual business. Academy of the Canyons is currently in the seventh year of offering the popular class, and several other high schools are actively pursing the idea of starting a regular day version of this program. Students in Virtual Enterprise run a full-fledged (virtual) company including product development, marketing, advertising and sales, accounting, and more. Participation in the class can include student participation in trade fairs and conferences, and students who successfully complete this course of study will have a real grasp of both entrepreneurship, and the ins-and-outs of running a company. ROP officials visited AOC's class/company, Adventure Outdoors, to get tips on the new after-hours class offering.

Golden Valley Seniors Study Business Ethics

Business in high school isn't usual. However, seniors in English 12B at Golden Valley High School have first hand experience in the ethical dilemmas employers face each day—employees stealing, passing private information, using the internet improperly, sexual harassment, punctuality, and other improper business behavior. Junior Achievement sent volunteers into Denise Eldon's, Joanna Sarff's, and Janay Chapin's classes to present the ethical dilemmas. Each week





for seven weeks students brainstormed solutions and techniques to solve the problems using a code of ethics. The culminating activity is a training video produced by each group that addresses a common dilemma. Selected students and business volunteers were invited to a "Meet and Greet' lunch, a common networking activity in the business community. The presentation has been so successful that a second offering of seven sessions will be added next fall at Golden Valley.

Disabled Students Invited to Prom

Disabled students from across the Hart District can look forward to all the glamour and memories of a high school prom, thanks to the Valencia High School Associated Student Body. This year's event will be held Saturday, May 24, and will feature a dinner and dancing to music presented by a disk jockey. A local salon is donating hair and nails for event. The first such prom was an unqualified success last year, and some 70 students are expected to attend this year's event as well. Students from all of the district's Special Day Classes SC2 and SC5 have been invited, along with their teachers and teaching assistants. ASB student Katya Ortiz is organizing this year's event.

<u>Hispanic Businesses Recognize District Staff</u>

Hart District Superintendent Jaime Castellanos and Canyon High School campus supervisor Nellie De La Cerda will be honored at the fifth annual Excelencio Awards Ceremony hosted by the SCV Chamber of Commerce Hispanic Business Committee. This year's event will be held Thursday, May 22, at the SCV Repertory East Theatre in downtown Newhall. Castellanos is among three community leaders cited for improving the lives of Hispanic youth. De La Cerda will receive a Community Service Award for her 16-plus years of contributions to the local school community. She was nominated by several community members for her work in keeping schools safe and bringing diversity to the SCV's multi-cultural community.

Valencia Junior Studies Climate Change

Dylan Beal, a junior at Valencia High School, is off to Cornell University this summer, where he is hoping to further his research as part of the school's College and Career Explorations program in the College of Agriculture & Life

Sciences. Dylan earned a scholarship for the summer program through original research he has been conducting on global climate change. Last summer, Dylan was one of only 150 California high school students selected to participate in COSMOS (California State Summer School for Math & Science) at UC Davis. He chose "Anatomy of Global Climate Change" as his course of study. Within this program, he received a grant from Intel towards developing and executing his own research project, "The Effect of Global Climate Change on a Darkling Beetle Population." As part of the grant, he submitted a research paper to the Southern California Regional Junior Science & Humanities Symposium and was one of 24 students chosen to present their work at this year's symposium at UC Irvine.



Saugus Percussion to Join "The Killer Bs"

The percussion section from the Saugus High School band will join the symphony orchestra from Grace Baptist Church for the annual Celebrate Music Concert, scheduled for 10 a.m. May 31 at the church. Theme of the free concert is The Killer "Bs," featuring musical favorites Brandenburg Sinfona-Bach, music from Bizet, highlights from "West Side Story" by Bernstein, Flight of the Bumblebee, a Beach Boys medlay, Barnum and Bailey favorites and more.
